I wrote these few lines to let you know how things seem to stand in Nova Scotia. One month the night I landed I went to see your people. Their I found great changes for the better. John Marwood and Jane Johns wife is a tidy little craft and James bloke is a first rate Jink of a chap I think they are both well matched. The old folks have only your sister with them now your father has failed very much but he is strong your mother is the same as when I left. The farm is the best of its size in Nova Scotia they have the best hay that I have seen since I left England and all their Crops are good if the place had you on it with some money to build I think it would be worth £3000. Your father is very anxious that you would come home I told him what you told me that if he would give you the whole of the property that you would either come home or send home what would clear it of debt. all at your fathers the second met was their they are all
well I was at Mr Phillips I only saw Mr P & had Hannah

gave them the presents they seemed to think you had
round them pretty well I do intend to take a turn
round all of them when I get home I have been sick ever
since I left England I had a very bad cough
now for times in journal the cars runs to twice as in
the first class & in the second Markets are good you can
get a first rate price for every thing you have to sell they fight
on politics worse than ever the Catholics have turned tories
to a man but for all that the Liberals have a majority in
the house now we believe that I am likely to stay in this
country all though everything seems pretty slow I have
mad Father an offer which I think he will take if so I
will be stuck safe Father has been offered £1000 for George
Farm but he did not sell it George is at Fraser River he has
a Government built a Detective Officer he does not like the place
I think I will try to get him home my Brother William has
started for Australia I could not persuade him to stay he
was to sail from Boston on the 6th of August you will see
him and he will tell you the news now we if you start
for home try and come in a steamer to Liverpool you will
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Send your Bills by the Bank do not carry them with you you
cannot do better than come by the Cunard boats from Liverpool
we came by Ireland to Newfoundland but was badly taken in
I want you to give my love and respect to all my friends
but a love all to Mr. & Mrs. and the kids. I hope if you have had
luck you will have an increase by this I long to see you and
well I ought for you and your wife was the best friends
I ever had a friend in need is a friend in deed if you do
not intend to come home I ask of you a favour to write
me a letter now and then but I would say soon it will be to
your advantage Poor George his position is a hard one good night
